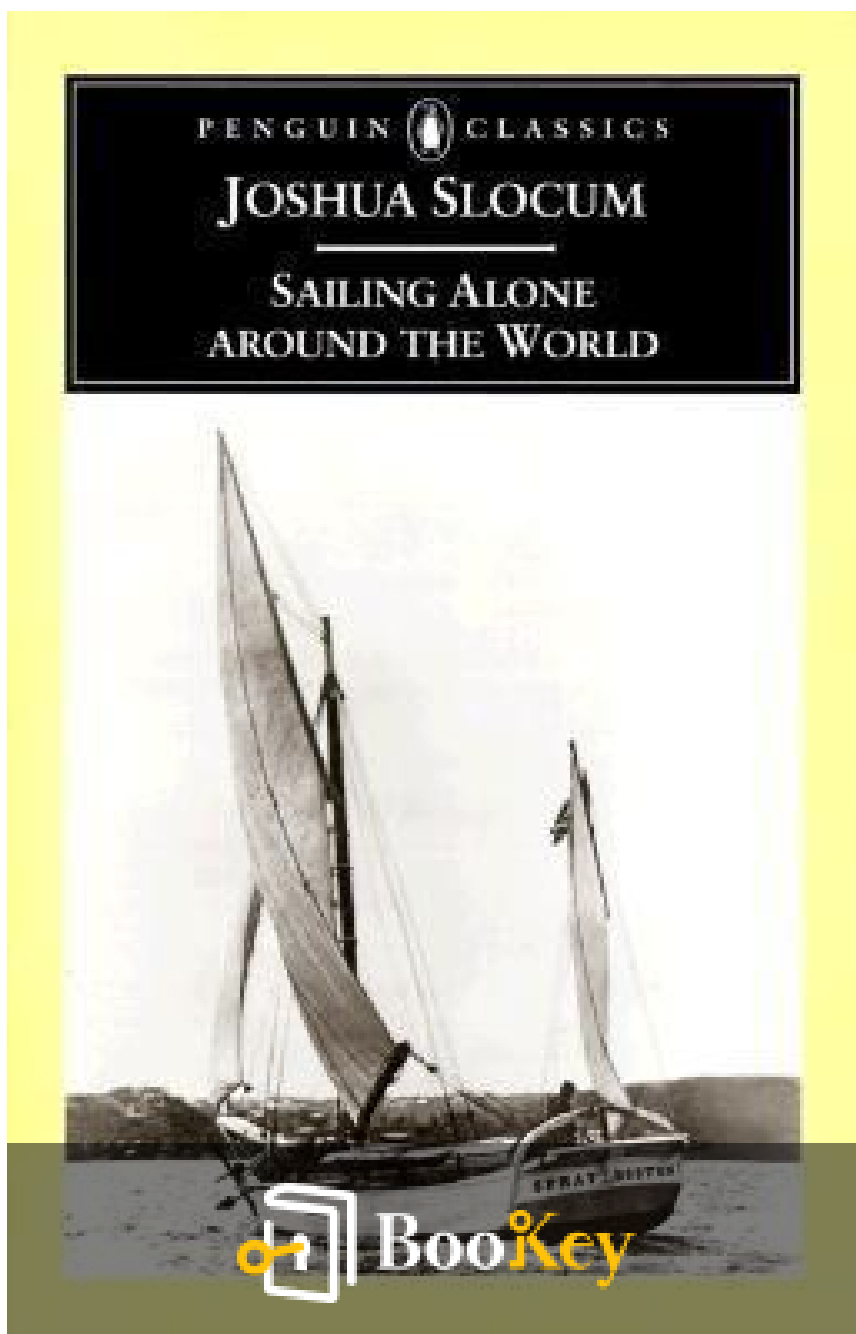

The Spray's distinctive short ends offered her

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advantages in turbulent seas, positioning her as a formidable competitor against traditional sailing vessels.

## **Sail-plan Details**

Slocum describes the sail-plan that outlines both the rigging configuration used during the Atlantic crossing and subsequent adjustments made for later segments of the journey. Transitioning from a sloop-rig to a yawl-rig enhanced the Spray's maneuverability and reduced the demands on the mainsail. The rigging system comprises various sails designed for efficiency, though it is noteworthy that Slocum maintained a minimalist approach to labor-saving equipment.

## **Performance and Navigation Achievements**

With pride, Slocum recounts the Spray's extraordinary performance, particularly a notable 2,700-mile ocean journey during which she maintained a steady course for weeks with minimal steering. This capability underscores both the robustness of her design and Slocum's sailing proficiency. The account speaks to the joy of solo sailing and the deep connection between the sailor and their vessel.

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Addressing young adventurers, Slocum encourages aspiring sailors to embrace the call of the sea, stressing that while challenges abound, they are often exaggerated.
