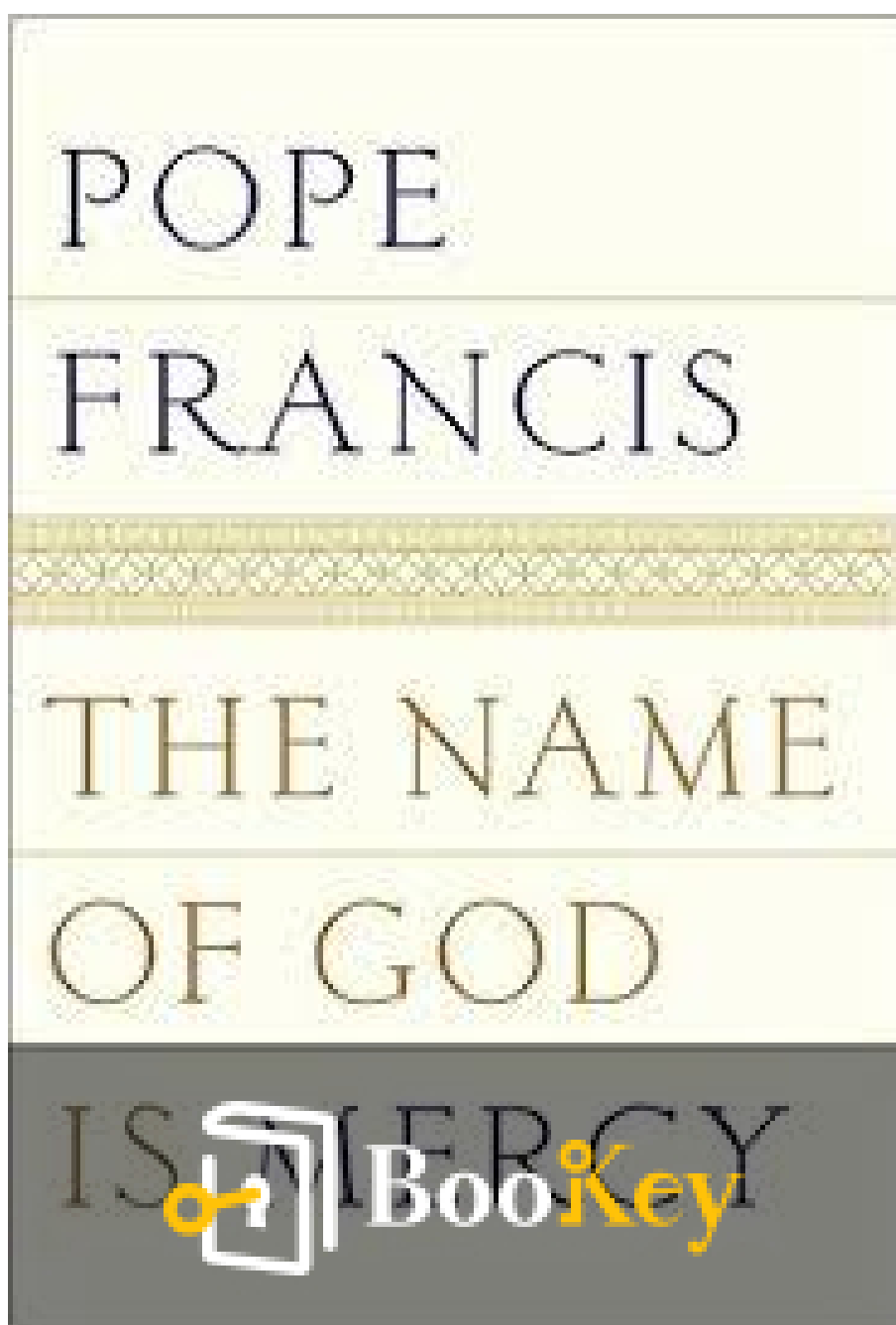

It holds particular significance as it is celebrated on the 50th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council, representing a renewed mission for the Church to convey God's love in contemporary society.

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As the Jubilee prepares to close on November 20, 2016, it calls believers to reflect on the mercy received and to become vessels of mercy for others. The chapter emphasizes the teachings of Saint Thomas Aquinas, who articulates that mercy reveals God's omnipotence, and illustrates this with examples from the Old Testament, demonstrating a consistent narrative of God's compassion throughout history, as echoed in the Psalms.

Jesus' ministry is depicted as a series of merciful acts—healing the sick, forgiving sinners, and emphasizing joy in forgiveness through parables. This sets a precedent for believers to extend mercy to one another, reinforcing the Church's identity as a messenger of mercy and its mission to spread compassion.

Pope Francis urges a revival of the Church's commitment to mercy, advocating for caregiving and compassionate outreach, especially towards marginalized communities. The chapter frames Lent as a time for believers to deepen their understanding of mercy through prayer, fasting, and charitable actions, while the Sacrament of Reconciliation is highlighted as key to experiencing God's mercy.

In a powerful declaration, the Pope introduces the concept of Missionaries of Mercy, tasked with embodying the Church's commitment and guiding the faithful towards conversion. This chapter illustrates a call to transformation for all, reminding readers that justice and mercy are interrelated, with God's

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compassion ultimately surpassing human notions of justice.

Further, the chapter discusses indulgences within the Jubilee, portraying them as manifestations of God's desire for forgiveness and reconciliation. It highlights that the theme of mercy resonates across various faith traditions, promoting dialogue and understanding. Mary, the Mother of God, is also presented as a figure of divine mercy, serving as an intercessor for believers.

Ultimately, Chapter 11 encapsulates the importance of translating the teachings of mercy into daily life, urging Christians to live out this virtue actively, thereby extending hope and love to all individuals as part of their faith journey.

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
