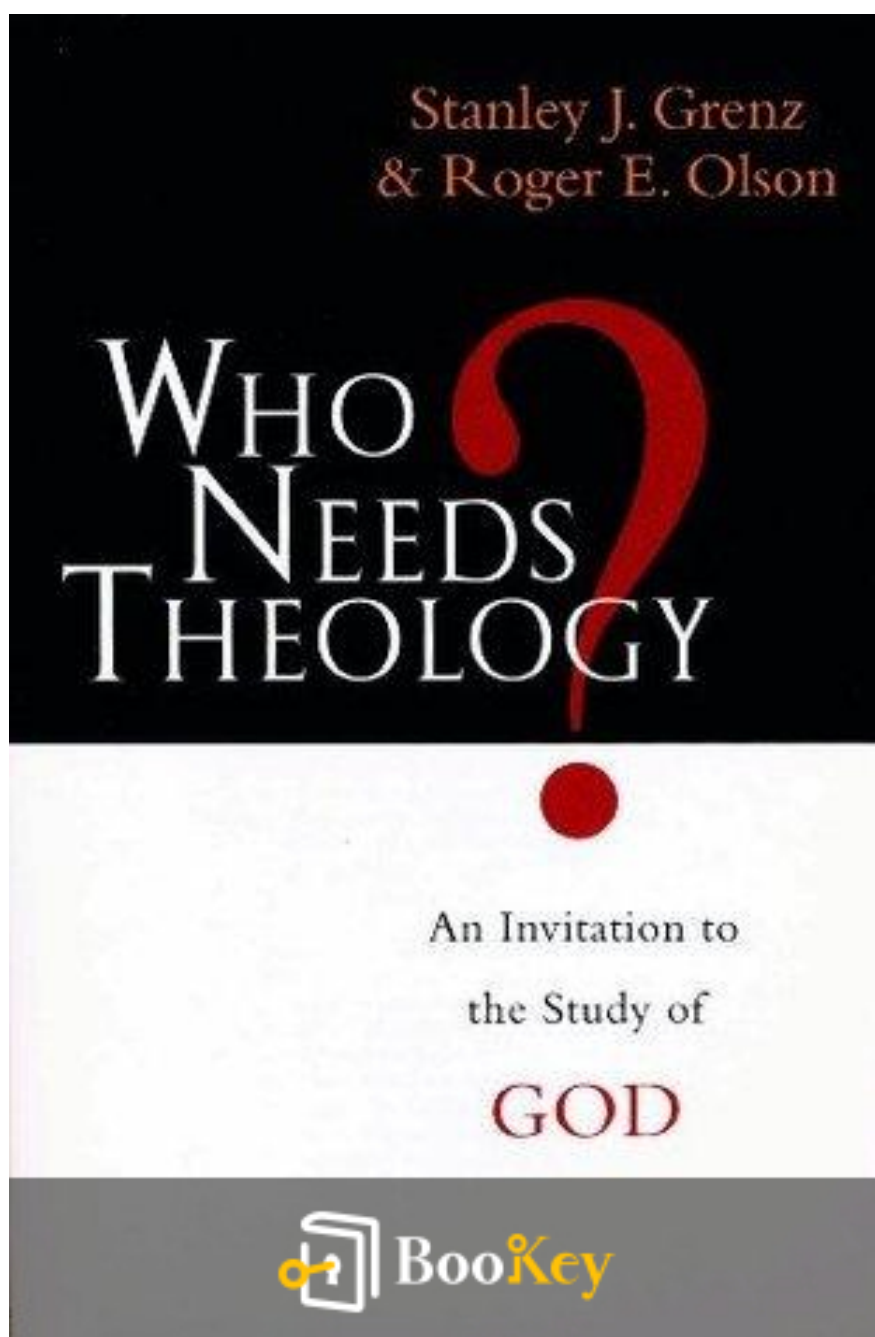

Before the schism, the Christian church was largely unified, albeit with some disputes over authority and doctrine. Key disagreements, notably regarding the bishop of Rome's power and the Trinity's articulation, culminated in a formal division. This split resulted in distinct theological approaches: the Eastern Orthodox tradition focused on mysticism and worship, while Roman Catholic theology emphasized a structured authority and ongoing connection to ecclesiastical councils.

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of Christian doctrine and firmly rejects papal infallibility.
